

MESSAGE FROM LOCUM RECTOR - REV'D SANDRA

Dear people of faith,

As we move into the Easter Season our Gospel today presents us with the account of the greatly misunderstood Apostle, Thomas.

He has been referred to pejoratively as "Doubting Thomas" throughout the ages because Thomas lived by the adage "seeing is believing" and he looked for certain tangible signs to shore up his belief.

However, as you consider the story of Thomas after the Lord's resurrection, have you ever realized that Thomas never doubts the Risen Lord?

Thomas doubts the word and the witness of the other disciples yet, when the Risen Jesus turns up a week later, Thomas is filled with faith. "My Lord and my God," he confesses.

In this story from John, it is not Christ who occasions disbelief in Thomas, but Christ's disciples gathered there in the Upper Room. Thomas simply did not find his friends to be credible.

Jesus' language at the Last Supper is one of riddles. It is almost possible to see Thomas, brows furrowed, trying to follow the implications of everything Jesus is saying, and finally blurting out: "We don't know where you are going. How can we possibly know the way!" Thomas surely wasn't alone in his confusion.

Thomas did not understand but he wanted to! He can't follow Jesus unless he knows where and how. It's as simple as that.

The Lord arrives when Thomas is out. The disciples are gathered in fear behind locked doors. Jesus appears and fills them with joy. He confers on them a mission and makes his presence and power known to his closest friends.

But Thomas isn't present. Thomas returns and they tell him they have seen the Lord -- but for Thomas, <u>something</u> doesn't ring true. If they have seen the Lord why are they still locked up tight in that room? If they are filled with such joy, why couldn't he read it on their faces?

If they have been empowered by the Spirit of God to complete Christ's work on earth – what are they waiting for?

So Thomas says to them, in so many words, "I don't find you believable." Thomas – simple, loyal, loving, straightforward, down to earth, direct -- who didn't understand but wanted to, who longed to follow Jesus but who needed to know the way.

Thomas didn't doubt the Risen Lord - he doubted the word of his friends! Thomas found it highly unlikely that the Lord was Risen because he was surrounded by a group of witnesses whom he simply did not find to be credible.

There is an ancient saying in the Eastern Church: If you want to know if Jesus is really Risen, look around at the faces you see in Church at the Easter vigil.

Thomas <u>could not</u> read the presence of the Risen One on the faces of his friends...

What would he read on our faces? What do we read on one another's faces? This question has everything to do with the ultimate success of the mission of the church.

We need to look and behave like a credible community of faith a community that has seen the Lord and been transformed – something is readily seen by others through the quality of our Christian lives.

Readings for Today

Acts 4.32-37 Differences of opinion are inevitable in human persons but spiritual unity is essential. Without spiritual unity the church can not survive. The early church thrived because of their generosity and spiritual unity.

Psalm 133 David states that unity is pleasant and precious. Unfortunately this is not always so in churches and people disagree and cause disunity over unimportant issues. Some delight in causing tension by discrediting others. Yet unity is essential because it renews and revitalizes communities of faith as credible witnesses to Jesus.

1 John 1.1 – 2.2 This letter was written by John, one of Jesus' original 12 disciples. John writes about fellowship with other believers giving three principles behind Christian fellowship. (1) It is grounded in the testimony of God's Word. Without this underlying strength togetherness is impossible. (2) It is mutual. Dependent on the unity of the believers and (3) It is renewed daily by the Holy Spirit. It is made possible only through a living relationship with the Risen Christ.

John 20. 19-31 Jesus gave the disciples their Spirit-powered and Spirit-guided mission – to preach the good news of God's salvation. To understand the life and mission of Jesus more fully we need to study the scriptures.
