

From Grahame

In worship over the past weeks we have reflected on the Luke's version of things and Jesus has taught us through a number of parables addressed to unbelievers, one addressed to the disciples and this week Jesus speaks directly to the Pharisees who have been mocking his teaching. Luke describes the Pharisees as money lovers, so they are clearly identified by Jesus with the rich man of this week's parable. What are we meant to learn from this? What is God saying to us?

I once heard a person on the radio scold a radio commentator because he didn't know his 'scriptures'. The caller boasted what a good Christian they were because, as in the parable of the widow's mite, they gave all they could spare to the church, bzzzz wrong. The whole point of the parable of the widow's mite in Mark 12.42-44 is not that the widow gave what she could spare, but that she gave all she had. But that teaching is a bit hard so we adapt it to suit our situation, to further our point of view of what God is saying to us. This is what the Pharisees did. This is what Jesus was exposing. The Pharisees had corrupted the Law and used the resources God provided to make themselves appear more important, to have for themselves, fine linens and places of honour.

It really doesn't matter how well we recite Bible passages, or even how often we read the Bible, unless we are prepared to hear the message God's Holy Word brings; unless we are willing to follow in the way of Jesus. The rich man in Jesus' parable this week is often portrayed as someone who just came a bit late to repentance. If only they had lived a little longer, if only there had been some suitably dramatic event which could have revealed to them the need to repent? Maybe if someone had come and personally told them how important it is to listen to God and obey the commandments? Maybe then? Why didn't they listen? We will do better. If God thought this was really important surely there would be some way of giving us the message which could not be denied.

Anyone who says Jesus doesn't have a sarcastic sense of humour is just not paying attention. The rich man says: "No, father Abraham, but if someone from the dead goes to them, they will repent. He said to him, if they do not listen to Moses and the Prophets, they will not be convinced even if someone rises from



But what if we built special buildings where people would know to come to hear and learn what God has done for us in the life, death, resurrection and ascension of Jesus? Maybe then?

The rich man came very late to repentance because there in the torment of Hades he still had not heard the message. He still didn't get it. When he looked up and saw Lazarus with Abraham he saw a slave who he felt Abraham should use to send water to quench his thirst or if not that, perhaps to run errands for him back home to his household so that they may be saved. He still did not understand that Lazarus stood with Abraham finally as a free man, not a slave. The rich man does not understand what he has done wrong in life and continues after death in the only way he knows, focused on his own wants and desires, completely missing what God intends.

We know helping each other makes our communities stronger and makes our own health better. We know loving each other is what God wants. Again, it seems the Holy Scriptures could have been written yesterday as the lessons we should learn from them are more relevant today than ever. The rich man perhaps thought he had been very successful and this would gain him a preferred place with God. What God is calling us to be in our generosity to others, is faithful stewards of the gifts we receive. The rich man thought even after death he was entitled, even though in life he had neglected his responsibility to be a faithful steward to those who needed help.

The Pharisees thought they were entitled. They had this idea the money they received was theirs and they could do with it whatever they liked. They forgot that all they had was a gift from God, given to them so that they could provide God's blessing to others. So, we must ask ourselves, are we more interested in our entitlements then our responsibilities, are we blind like the rich man to the Lazarus at our gates? Do we acknowledge the blessings we receive as gifts from God, do we use them the way we know God intends?
