

From Grahame

I like to garden. I don't know much about gardening but I like to try. I am sure you all know how to tell a weed from a useful plant? You pull on it and if it comes out easily, it was a useful plant.

I don't know much about farming I couldn't tell you one variety of grain from another. I visited a property once and in the course of catching up I mentioned that the wheat seemed to have gone to head early because the stalk was quite short. I asked what had caused this problem? The farmer looked at me sideways and said 'I paid extra for that'. Of course, there are now varieties which intentionally have less stalk because the stalk is not what you are after, unless you were making a hay bale house or thatch. Uhhh.... it's so confusing.

If we get into this much trouble judging wheat and good plants from weeds, what about when we start judging people's lives and how we respond to them? What about if we were judging their eternal life? Way too much stress there. You may be thinking 'well Grahame you're just being weak, you need to be able to make the hard decisions'. I know I need to be able to make hard decisions about my life, my responsibilities and God takes responsibility for God's part. I think it works better that way. The way God intended. Then the real miracle happens. When I take responsibility for my part, I come to see that God has taken responsibility for the consequences and welcomes me into relationship.

How many people did God create. A couple, some, many? All! How many people does God love? Does God love a couple of people, one or two, just the really nice ones, a few people, some people? All people! How many people do you know who started off a bit rocky but finished strong? We see through eyes of our human prejudices. If we take on God's part, if we set ourselves up as the judges of God's people, if judging were left to us would we even pass? Jesus saw in people a potential others missed. When we judge people as unworthy of God's love we work against the coming kingdom. God loves everyone. God's grace is open to everyone. A bit like alternate realities, the weeds and the wheat are left to grow by God.

Leave them to grow. Where is the miracle in that? The miracle is that by the grace of God in Christ Jesus the weeds may be transformed and bear fruit. Now that's a miracle. God has no acceptable level of attrition. When I come before the judgement seat I'm not bringing the excuse 'well I destroyed a lot of wheat but I brought you this one'. I'm going with the whole lot and saying 'you said you knew what to do with all this'.

Jesus spoke of weeds and wheat. Sometimes it is hard to tell the difference between the weeds and the wheat. It can be tempting to put all our efforts into trying to judge the weeds from the wheat so that we may get rid of the weeds. Jesus tells us if we allow ourselves to become consumed by the search for weeds we will damage the wheat. We will damage the very thing we are trying to nurture.

If we spend all our time focused on the weeds then weeds are all we will ever see. We are each called by God to work for the good, to nurture our sisters and brothers of all the peoples of the earth. To be a blessing. We do not serve this purpose if we only focus on the bad. The task of judgement has been deferred until a later time and it is not our job.

Like all families we will have disagreements and like families throughout the generations we are called to love one another anyway. Love God, love your neighbour. Don't do it because I say so, do it because it is right, do it because Jesus did it, do it because this is how God's will may be done on earth as in Heaven.

All through this day dear Lord, let me touch as many lives as possible for you, and every life I touch please bless by your Holy Spirit, whether through the words I speak, the prayer I breathe or the life I live; so shall your kingdom come on earth as in heaven. Amen.
