

From Grahame

Anyone who has declared their faith in the presence of non-believers can empathise with what is being done to Jesus in this week's Gospel reading. Faced with the truth, the Good News of Jesus Christ, the Pharisees and the Sadducees seek to find anything that may tear down what Jesus would build. They are unsuccessful and are forced to go away. What's really going on, what's it all about. What's the story?

Jesus is asked for a yes or no answer. If he answers yes, he is siding with the emperor and is shown to be deficient in the eyes of the Jewish authorities by supporting their oppressor; if he says no he is guilty of treason in the eyes of the Roman authorities and will be killed. We like yes or no answers to complicated questions. Imagine someone said to a bloke down the street "now I want a yes or no answer, have you stopped mistreating your family?" Any response condemns the one being asked the question. Jesus turns the tables again "show me the coin". By presenting a coin with the head of the emperor those seeking to trap Jesus trap themselves. They have been using Roman currency to keep themselves out of trouble with the Roman authorities.

'Give to Caesar the things that are Caesar's, and to God the things that are God's'. At first glance this appears simple, give to Caesar, pay your taxes, and give to God the observance due to God. What part of our lives is God's? It may be helpful to consider this question in the negative. What part of our lives is not God's?

Those posing the question to Jesus had an agenda; they wanted to pigeonhole the politics of Jesus' ministry, they wanted to identify Jesus' faction so that they could disregard what he said. Jesus would not be placed in a faction; Jesus would not be placed in a pigeon hole. Jesus' response is a defence against this and a challenge to the listeners. What part does God play in our lives? Does factional loyalty come above our commitment to God? In our contemporary situation, do the difficulties of our government mean more to us than God? Does the new television show or latest smart phone mean more to us than God?

Mission of the Month Parish Pantry



This is a valuable part of the parish out reach. It helps supply food to those in our community that are less fortunate. It is supplied out of the office in Mullumbimby.

Years ago, I had a friend in ministry in the 'Outback', who identified as a Christian. When he went with his fellow Christians to visit at hospitals the staff would ask what denomination he was and he would say 'Christian'. The staff found this confronting. My friend would not identify as other than Christian. This was both a defence against being placed in someone else's pigeon hole of who he should be allowed to visit and a challenge to those framing the question, as to how their interpretation of God was influencing their actions. Remember God calls us to follow in the way of Jesus, to live the Christian life, before anything else. When we welcome people through the waters baptism, there is no mention of the Anglican Church. Through the waters of baptism, we are made part of the body of Christ, the church universal. When we seek baptism we are seeking to be made one with Christ in his death so that we may be one with him in the resurrection to come.

The thing that I can testify about my friend from out west, is that he is committed to Christ and passionate about the Gospel. To my knowledge he does not promote the teachings of any particular faction. To me this seems enlightened and refreshing. To some it may seem frightening because they do not understand how to respond to someone outside the structure of their particular version of things. They don't know how to respond to someone who does not fit their preconceptions. I am afraid that we have spent so long second guessing each other that we are in danger of failing to recognise the truth we profess to proclaim. I sometimes wonder if we even know what it looks like any more. To have witnessed this type of openness is very exciting and very challenging.

Having dealt with the Pharisees the Sadducees then have a go. You see, they had a problem with the resurrection. They paint some picture of all these poor lost husbands sitting around in Heaven waiting for their dinner with the long-suffering widow not knowing who to serve first. Is that really what we think the resurrection will be like? Do we have such little faith in God? I don't think so. We know of

some of the great things God can do. We know the things God has already done in our lives or we would not be reading this today. As Jesus reminds us 'God is the God of Abraham, the God of Isaac, and the God of Jacob'. This is our God and our God is faithful. The Sadducees have drifted off track and seek to mislead lead others by suggesting the God who separated the oceans from the land will not be able to cope with the relationship counselling of the resurrection.

God is faithful and God calls us into a faithful relationship with God and with each other.

All through this day dear Lord, let me touch as many lives as possible for you, and every life I touch please bless by your Holy Spirit, whether through the words I speak, the prayer I breathe or the life I live; so shall your kingdom come on earth as in heaven. Amen.

Exodus 33.12-23; Psalm 99; 1 Thessalonians 1.1-10; Matthew 22.15-33
