The Reflectionary

From Grahame

During the week some of us gathered for a pancakes. Then some gathered Wednesday morning to mark the beginning of Lent. Times of celebration and times of reflection. During Lent we are encouraged to gather with others in prayer, fasting and study. What does it mean to fast? We joke about giving up chocolate, about giving up fatty foods, and luxuries. Is that what God wants from us? If we know anything about God revealed through Jesus, we know that Jesus is about being authentic. Jesus is the real thing and God calls us to follow the example of Jesus in being real, being authentic. What will our fasting be this Lent? What is it that we need to give up? I suggest that it may have little to do with what we eat and everything to do with what we believe and the way we act.

Psalms often get some bad press. They were really our first hymns. If you take the time to be fully present as you read some of the psalms you can almost find yourself singing them. In our worship psalms are used as a bridge between one reading of Holy Scripture and another. The portion of Psalm 25 we are reflecting on this week begins in fear, our fear of failure, our fear of shame. We wait on the Lord for guidance, we wait on the Lord to show us the way. This requires that we are listening, we need to be open to being guided. This week's portion concludes with words of reassurance that God is steadfast, God is authentic, Gods is worthy of our praise and our trust.

In our other readings we are reminded of the rainbow and God's covenant with us. Through the baptism of Jesus, God reassures us that we may trust what God has done in Jesus the Christ. This is the foundation of our faith, our trust in what God has done, is doing and will do. There will always be excuses if we want them, to not do what we know we should do. Yet our faith is founded on our trust in God and not excuses.

In this first week of Lent our scripture readings reflect both Jesus' time in the wilderness and the period of rain

The Op Shop Link to Community

Our Parish Op Shops offer far more than retail trading. They are a church link to the community. How we treat our customers and fellow workers are seen by the hundreds who pass through our doors as a reflection of church attitudes to the many aspects of life.

Goods are given away to those in need -and there are always many of them – conversations take place, customers share their stories, their hardships and their joys. We know when a new baby is born, when ill health or financial stress take over. While sharing confidences over the sorting table workers may know more about their companions than their own families because op shop workers become a family.

Cups of tea and thermos fills may be offered to those sleeping rough. Food vouchers may be offered. This is church working in the reality of today.

We are blessed with also having Brenda as our Op Shop Counsellor, there to provide help and the joy that Brenda's presence brings.

A percentage of all money raised goes to selected charities, the rest into general church funds.

At the Mullumbimby Op Shop, seemingly tireless workers sort, wash and iron garments ready for sale. There is an advantage on being on a main thoroughfare but a disadvantage because unlike our other two Op Shops there is a rent to be made to offset profit .The shop more than exceeds its goal as well as the service it gives to all.

Any doubt of the importance of the Byron Op Shop was dispelled by their co-ordinator, Cathy, had to open the shop after the Christmas break earlier than anticipated due to pressure of public need.

At Bangalow we eagerly away Council's approval for our intended extension that will ease the strain and provide better conditions for staff and customers. Piles of donations wait on the verandah and bins each day, blocking entrances and scattered along the ground. Demand is huge and we have customers coming from as far afield as Yamba, Brisbane and the Gold Coast looking for the bargains we offer.

Items that are considered not suitable for our outlets are packed to send to New Guinea, taking care not to send anything dirty or torn, realising New Guineans do not want these things either. At Bangalow we also send light reading matter, shoes and soft toys.
