

The Reflectionary

From Grahame

The Gospel according to John describes the encounter between the disciples and the risen Jesus differently to the other Gospel writers. John shows them more clearly as a group that believes they are beaten, hiding behind locked doors, in fear. They have just had their leader killed; the one they thought would conquer their oppressors. The disciples are in a bad way. This is not the way they thought it would be. When ever I reflect on this passage words form an Alex Lloyd song come into my mind "we were never meant to fail". Into this situation appears Jesus, alive, the risen Christ. Now Jesus tells them to get out and spread the good news, 'as the Father has sent me, I am sending you' (John 20.21). You can imagine them, you want us to go out there; or to place this in a more Anglican context perhaps - we've done that before and it didn't seem to work.

Jesus went out into the world and was killed. Jesus now calls his disciples to go out into the world – to be killed? This is why it is so important to worship on Good Friday and on Easter Day, it is too easy to focus on the cross as a sign of defeat and miss the victory. This is what that first group in the upper room were doing. We have the advantage of being able to look back from a future perspective, to shout at the disciples 'Christ is Risen Hallelujah'. Jesus transformed the cross, that most abominable of symbols, into a sign of hope. Jesus calls the disciples to go into the world with the hope of the resurrection, proclaiming a risen Lord and through faith in him draw others to share in the resurrection to eternal life.

Then Thomas arrives. We have an impression of faithful Thomas, as doubting Thomas because he dared to say aloud what everyone else was thinking. Just a little while ago he was the go-getter in the Lazarus encounter saying in John 11.16, 'let us also go, that we may die with him'. Where was Thomas that he had missed that first encounter with the risen Lord? He was not locked in the upper room.

Was he the only one out doing something while the others justified their behaviour? Now he doubts. Thomas had been willing to die now he is being asked to live by faith and by doing so have life in the name of Jesus. Thomas had all his hopes and dreams invested in this ministry, now in the midst of his grief he is asked to believe again.

Sometimes I think we get so caught up in wishing things were different that we miss out on what we were actually working towards. Thomas with the others almost miss the point of all that had happened, the gift of eternal peace. As I said at the start the Gospel according to John sees things differently. John is different and that is alright with me. I particularly like John because he reminds me that it is alright to be different. Not better, not worse, just different. Thomas is different. When the rest were saying don't go to Lazarus or you'll be killed, Thomas says let's go. When everyone else is saying 'We have seen the Lord' Thomas for his own reasons as part of his individual journey, doesn't believe them. Jesus accepts Thomas's difference and appears again.

I have a lot of time for Thomas because there is a little Thomas in each of us. May we like Thomas say of Jesus, My Lord and my God, and go out as a people following a resurrected Jesus whose glory fills all creation. Peace be with you.
